A LASTING TRIBUTE

Since 1984, the Shemer Art Center has been proud to serve as a lasting tribute to a woman who devoted her life to improving the quality of life for all Phoenicians and Arizonans. Her gift has become for its visitors a place of refuge to regroup and renew their spirits, creativity & imagination.

We are extremely proud to have been chosen one of the Points of Pride for the City of Phoenix.

Born April, 19, 1919, in Ames, Iowa, Martha Shemer was the youngest child of Dr. John M. Evvard and his wife, Mattie. Along with her siblings, John and Mary Margaret, she spent an idyllic childhood taking nature hikes, studying the trees, the birds, the butterflies, and the stars. In 1933, due to her father's health, the family moved to Phoenix, Arizona, where she attended Phoenix Union High School.

Upon graduation in 1937, she married Jack Shemer and raised a family of two boys. Throughout their marriage, Martha bought and sold real estate. When she first saw the historic home in Arcadia, she proclaimed "someone needs to save this beautiful, historic



home and grounds." Martha Shemer purchased and donated the three-acre lot and historic home, first built in 1919, to the City of Phoenix. She had two dreams: to preserve the property and to provide an arts education facility and community center for the citizens of Arizona. In 1984, the City dedicated the facility as the Shemer Art Center and Museum.

CLASSES: CERAMICS

INTRO TO THROWING, Alan Jones



This class will focus on the basic skills of wheel throwing - centering, opening and pulling vessels - followed by learning to form cylinders, bowls and cups. Students will also learn to evaluate form and how form serves a vessel's function. Students will learn about clay properties while working in stoneware clay and high-temperature glazes.

INTRO TO HANDBUILDING, Alan Jones



Handbuilding is the fundamental construction method for creating sculptural and functional ceramic forms. Students will undertake a variety of projects including slab construction, round and flat coil construction, pinch-forming methods, surface texturing and carving. Students will work in high-temperature stoneware clay and will be introduced to glazing techniques.

LOW TEMP: THE NARRATIVE FIGURE, Linda Taylor



Basic forming techniques used to construct hand-built sculpture with an emphasis on the human figure will be the focus of this class. Students will be guided in developing a narrative of their own devise - be it fictional, self-experiential, and symbolic or based on a historical fact. Students will also develop an understanding of how to utilize space using their sculptural construction as a canvas. Demonstrations in surface techniques will include relief, basic textures, carving, under glaze layering, washes of oxides and glazes. The pieces will be fired at low-temperature in electric kilns. Level: Beginner to Intermediate

LT-1 - Tuesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 9/10-10/29 (8 sessions) \$225

CLAY DRAWING WORKSHOP, Beth Shook



This Clay Drawing workshop will meet for two consecutive Saturdays to introduce drawing and adapted glaze applications on clay. The first day will include time to plan and prepare a green (unfired, dry raw clay) tile for a bisque firing. There will also be time for Q and A with the artist about her work and her drawing/glaze processes. During the second meeting students will develop the surface of their bisque tiles with colored slips and glazes in preparation for a Cone 6 oxidation glaze firing. Finished tiles will be available for student pick-up after the glaze firing.

ANIMAL EXPRESSIONS, Jane Kelsey-Mapel



Explore the expressive potential of animal imagery by creating clay sculptures of animals or animal/human "hybrids". For inspiration, instructor will show examples of animal sculptures by contemporary ceramic artists and discuss the fine line between human and animal as expressed in the works on display in the concurrent Shemer exhibition, Animal Other. Using slab construction techniques, participants will begin by creating wall masks and then move on to building an entire animal form. Students may bring photographic images as references for basic structure, but be encouraged to work loosely and expressively attempting to capture the essence of the animal spirit. The last day of the workshop, participants will apply translucent underglazes to their sculptures using washes and stains similar to watercolor techniques. Finished work will be available for pick-up after the glaze-firing.

POLYMER CLAY, Amber Wanielista



So many colors, so little time. This class gives you tools and the time to create some unique jewelry or figurines such as little angels or bears. Give them as gifts, save them for yourself or keep them to sell. Instructor's skills lie in assisting students to develop an art piece within their own skill level. Only polymer clay is needed as a tool to succeed in this class!

BASIC DRAWING, Elliott Everson



Drawing is a learned skill based on hand-eye coordination. Anyone can learn to draw, and it is a basic tool needed for all classes offered at the Southwest School of Art. Through free-hand drawing, students will render three-dimensional objects - using drawing principles of line, shape, value, texture, perspective and composition - in an enjoyable and relaxed atmosphere. Bring an 18 by 24-inch drawing pad, a selection of graphite pencils and an eraser; additional materials will be discussed during the first class.

COLORED PENCIL DRAWING STUDIO, Elliott Everson



This multi-level class is for beginners with some drawing background or for experienced studentartists who would like to refresh their drawing skills. Topics will explore value, space, composition and concept, as well as different drawing styles and materials. Students will move beyond using drawing merely to render objects accurately, and will come to view drawing as a challenging vehicle for expression of both form and narrative. Bring a sketchbook or drawing pad (size 11 by 14 or 18 by 24-inches) and a selection of colored pencils and an eraser; additional materials will be discussed during the first class.

COLORED PENCIL DRAWING: Beginning Landscapes, Amber Wanielista



Learn essential techniques and art principles needed for working skillfully with today's modern colored pencil. Color, control, & versatility are three of colored pencil's most winning featuresplus they are inexpensive to use. This outdoor colored pencil class will include 2 sessions in studio with instructor lecturing and demonstrating the process of landscape and the process of capturing architecture with a quick overview of perspective. The rest of the class will take place outdoors with instructor guidance and critique.

SUNDAY FIGURE DRAWING, Jack Adams



This course is for anyone who wants to work on the basics of drawing, from beginners to those who want to get back to drawing with a renewed vision. Through the model, participants develop their ability to see and then translate visual experience into drawing. This intensive offers a traditional structured class that will include timed poses for gesture, contour and finished drawings. It will focus on how to use form, space, and proportions to create a strong composition.

LEARN TO DRAW A FACE, Amber Wanielista



This course is a perfect intro to a beginning portrait-painting course. Students will learn to see like a portrait artist. Classes will cover basic elements in drawing faces and discovering proportions as well as the value of soft and hard edges and other techniques. Students will also learn the importance of expression in drawing. The last three sessions include observing and drawing a live model.

TORCH-FIRED ENAMELING, Michelle Startzman



Enameling is an ancient technique of fusing glass to a metal surface. Students will learn the basics of torch-fired enameling, with specific techniques including sifting, stencils, sgraffito, drawing techniques, and more. This class is designed to give the beginning student a strong foundation in enamel techniques with the use of a torch. There is a \$45 material fee.

DESERT JEWELRY, Shari Keith



Desert-dried cholla cactus skeletons are lacey and lovely and will become the basis for a unique necklace that reflects the beauty of the desert. In this workshop you will explore the wonderful shapes and textures of small desert treasures while learning some basic jewelry techniques such as sanding, making wire beads, using patina solutions to darken metal, embellishing your piece with turquoise beads, forging a clasp, and completing your necklace with seed beads. No previous jewelry experience is necessary. There is a \$20 materials fee.

FELTED FALL NECKLACES, Christy Puetz



This class is all about learning the basics of wet felting wool, beading, and embroidery techniques to create a beautiful necklace. Participants will create felt elements that will be embellished and added to the collar portion of their necklace. Choose a theme of fall leaves, flowers, or abstract. Create something unique to wear to holiday parties!

BASIC METAL & ENAMELING SKILLS, Larry Nisula



This class is all about introducing students to basic and fundamental techniques and tools used to create unique jewelry and metalsmithed objects. Students will design and make a banded silver ring with enameling enhancements. Topics covered will include sawing, basic forming and forging, findings, clasps, silver-soldering, riveting, surface embellishment and surface finishing.

TREASURE BRACELETS, Christy Puetz



Treat yourself and a friend to one-of-a-kind bracelets made of colorful and symbolic glass beads, or keep them both for yourself. Explore bead symbolism as a way to create a story with beads or just string whatever catches your eye. Fun for parents and teens together!

MICRODWELL DESIGNING, Tom Wagner



In this course, students will learn how to plan, budget and schedule the design and construction of their micro project. Discussions will include framing, interior and exterior finishes, insulation, and possibly plumbing and wiring. Evenings will be spent in the design studio, where students will contemplate how to efficiently utilize space as they create drawings, plans and models for their own micro dwellings. There will be guest speakers to talk about fabrication methods and be introduced to sources of salvaged materials that can be used in constructing microdwellings. Level: All levels

CLASSES: PAINTING

4 STUDIO WATERCOLOR PAINTING DAYS, Julie Gilbert Pollard



Bring your own painting ideas, or follow Julie's lead with a landscape composition she will present and demo. Above all, bring your desire to paint in watercolor! Students will work on paintings of their choice, with guidance and thoughtful critique from the instructor. Learn techniques to achieve your goals for your painting. Get suggestions on design, composition and focal point. Loosen up and try new methods of painting. Have fun with watercolor! This class will encourage the creative spirit in artists of all skill levels.

BASIC PAINTING, Sue Hunter



This is a fundamentals class in the format of a guided journey to free creative potential. It will begin with an exercise to loosen up the student then allow them to use this exercise to enhance the painting. Incorporated in the class structure will be lessons on color, value, and composition. Allowing the participants to learn painting through doing and not just seeing or reading. Level: Beginner to Intermediate

SH-7 – Tuesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 9/10-10/29 (8 sessions), \$225 SH-10 – Tuesdays, 9:00am-12:00pm 11/5-12/10 (6 sessions), \$175

REPRESENTATIONAL PAINTING IN OIL, Cynthia Peterson



Investigate both traditional and modern techniques of representational painting. Students will become familiar with the many materials used in oil painting - with emphasis on layering oils through glazing - and will examine how to cross and manipulate opaque and transparent paint with mediums. This class will also focus on composition and the principles for completing a well-designed painting. Please bring a sketchbook and pencil to the first class; a supplies list will be provided at that time. Prerequisite: Some drawing experience helpful.

PAINTING STUDIO, Sue Hunter



This class is designed to develop and clarify the student's painting style and expand their technical skills. Sue will tailor discussions and demonstrations to the developing needs of each student-artist. As the class progresses, students will have the opportunity to learn ways of adding other media to their paintings. Prerequisite: Previous painting experience. Bring a blank canvas or a work in progress, images or a sample of finished work, and painting supplies you currently use to the first class; suggestions for additional materials will be discussed at that time.

PASTEL PAINTING, Donna Stenger



Pastels have a depth and richness to them that is unique to this medium. We begin with the fun of blending colors before moving on to defining shapes in a still life or a landscape. Students will be introduced to different brands of pastels, papers and accessories and learn different methods of applying pastel for different effects. We will explore blending techniques and strokes and you will learn some simple techniques for blocking out a painting for a strong composition.

OPEN STUDIO PAINTING, Cynthia Peterson



Elemental problems of painting on a two-dimensional surface; structure and composition, color, flat pattern, modeling and light, paint handling, and texture. Students work from varied life sources and imagination in oil, watercolor, or acrylic.

| WATERCOLOR PAINTING, John Erwin



This class is for the first-time painter, as well as the student who would like to learn more about the various approaches to painting in this very direct medium. Demonstrations will be given each week showing students how to paint wet-on-wet washes, dry-on-wet washes and with a dry brush. Color theory as it relates to watercolor will be discussed. Intermediate level students, while developing an independent vision, will learn ways to improve their painting skills through advance demonstration, practice and critique.

COLOR DESIGN, Cynthia Peterson




Color Design is a two-day in-depth exploration of color theory and color interaction. This course considers color as a descriptive and expressive element of art, emphasizing color perception and application. Investigations of 2-dimensional design problems and the formal, technical, creative and psychological aspects of color usage will be introduced and emphasized. This course is essential for understanding how to use color and apply it effectively in all areas of art.

THE ART OF GUILDING, Agustin Vargas



Students will learn how to apply different leafing techniques using the size technique. Participants will learn how to apply a variety of leafing materials, such as gold, silver, and copper using a variety of surfaces. These surfaces are divided into four categories: Canvas, paper, metal and wood. This class is meant to serve as an introduction to guilding, and to allow students an opportunity to work on their own projects.

PLEIN AIR WITH PASTELS, Donna Stenger



Landscape is all around you. Paint on location, weather permitting, and create a beautiful and lasting painting. We'll go over composition, value, color and perspective. Have fun and make your paintings awesome! Individual instruction, all levels. Use this vibrant medium to create visually stunning landscapes. Composition, atmosphere, atmospheric and aerial perspective as well as light, shadow, value, composition and color will be covered. Explore the pastel medium in different ways for different effects. We will work outside, or depending on the weather you can bring sketches or photographs to work from. Learn what to extract from a photograph and what not to use.

ACRYLIC EXPLORATION, Agustin Vargas



Using acrylic paints and working from photographs, this workshop will guide students through the techniques of creating a contemporary landscape painting. Discussions and demonstrations regarding materials, color mixing, and other painting techniques are addressed for all levels of students, while individual expression is encouraged for those looking for more advanced instruction.

INTERMEDIATE DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY, Michel Sarda



Participants will develop their eye for photography and thoroughly get to know their camera. They will fine tune lighting skills and working with people. Challenging images -- low light and movement will be covered. They will also learn to finish and share their images.

BEGINNING DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY, Alan Staats



Start off on the right foot in digital photography, or fill in gaps in your basic skills. This workshop introduces the technical aspects of digital photography and the concepts behind photographic images. The emphasis is on skill building, creative picture making, editing and evaluating images. Students leave with a thorough knowledge of what the camera's controls do and which ones are best for each style of shooting. Instruction includes apertures, shutters, equivalent exposures, using available light, portraiture and other conceptual topics. The atmosphere in this class is one of exploration, practice and play. This class is for anyone new to digital SLR, or for anyone interested in fully exploring all its functions.

SUNDAY MORNING PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOPS, Michel Sarda



Join Michel Sarda for two-hour, hands-on digital photography workshops.




